A MESSAGE FROM THE MENAHEL



orah Tziva Lanu Moshe Morasha Kehilas Yaakov"

The Gemara in Sanhedrin (91b) states "One who withholds a halacha from his student, it is as if he stole from the inheritance of his ancestors. The Gemara then darshens this from our pasuk as it says "morasha" it is an inheritance for all of Klal Yisrael from the time of creation."

Simply this Gemara is telling us that Hashem gave the Torah to every member of Klal Yisrael, and therefore if a Rebbe purposely withholds a portion of Torah from his student who desires it, it is as if he is taking something which is rightfully the talmid's.

The Maharsha explains that the Gemara does not only refer to this past scenario, rather it even applies when a Rebbe would like his student to learn this piece of Torah. In fact the Maharsha says that even if the Rebbe tried to teach the Torah to the student, but the student had a difficult time grasping the material, the concept of the Gemara would still apply. He says if there is a student who has as much trouble as the student of Rav Prayda, who needed to be taught each lesson 400 different times, if the Rebbi does not reach him it is considered as if he has stolen his rightful inheritance.

The reason this is true is that every Jewish person has the ability to learn Torah. In fact everyone has their own "chailek" in Torah, as we ask Hashem in davening, "V'sain chelkeinu b'sorasecha". This chailek is unique to him; it is his special way of understanding the Torah and his special way of connecting to the Torah, and this is his birthright endowed to him by HaShem. Therefore every child is entitled to have a Rebbe that has the patience and wisdom to teach him the Torah in a way that he can understand and internalize it.

This is our mission at MTI. Students are placed in classes based on their learning styles, not merely by their grade level. Our staff is dedicated to educating each of our boys in the fashion that is suited to them, while at the same time lovingly and passionately reaching out to inspire each of their hearts and minds.

May we be Zoche to see the day when we see the fulfillment of the Pasuk, "Vechol Bonayich Limudei HaShem".

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GENERAL STUDIES UPDATE



n the general studies department at MTI, students learn the skills they need to be successful in life after high school. In today's world, these skills are more critical than ever, and we work to ensure that our students are college and career ready when they complete our program. In particular, we focus on the science and math skills that students will need in the booming areas of technology and engineering, and

the communication skills they will need to work and lead in the age of information

In our effort to properly focus the program on the skills students need, we have instituted a battery of testing based on the ACT College and Career Readiness Standards to gauge students' progress towards acquisition of these 21st century skills. The tests are provided by Cambridge Educational Services, who then gives us analytics and data that we can use to guide our curriculum development and to focus our students' ACT test preparation.

This year, the department features some new faces as well as some familiar ones who have been with us for a long time. Mr. Wade Newbrough, recently back from teaching in Asia, is our new social studies teacher. Dr. Tzvi Tannenbaum is a history scholar and has joined our faculty teaching Jewish history to our 12th grade students. We also have an all new science staff, with Mr. Greg Kramer – the talented glass blower from the City Museum - and the experienced and successful Dr. Steven Cranston working with students on increasingly rigorous, real-life, hands-on science lessons. Mr. David Jennings teaches English, having joined us last year. Mr. Charles Weede (math,) Mr. Erik Corley (math,) and Mr. Ralph Wirtel (English) have all been with us for several years, and their familiar faces add continuity to help ensure steady growth for the program.

On Tuesdays, students participate in our popular Electives program, which gives them the opportunity to learn and experience in areas outside the core curriculum. Adam Beck, from the Dave Simon School of Music, leads the exciting and noisy Band class, and by the end of the semester they sound really nice! Tony Biere is back teaching Art and Design, where students are learning about perspective and vanishing points while sketching cityscapes.
